## FBI Director Mueller Corroborates Congress' Allocation, Senator Grassley Indicates a Gov't Jet Will be Dispatched to Pick Up the Canadian Lawyer & Former Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volker Weighs in on MK-Ultra Gate as Does Senator John McCain

Right after the epiphany the accountability initiative aimed at the White House, Pentagon and CIA commenced and with the first complaint filing being with the FBI's Directorate of Intelligence. That this and all other undertakings failed miserably was indicative of an abuse of power checks and balances system that had become chronically dysfunctional. Encouraging is how the law enforcement agency's Director stepped up to the plate at his first opportunity and then did so again the next time he appeared in the diplomatic backchannel.

Is it only because he was in the 'electronic room' that Director Mueller showed himself to be committed to fixing what ails the FBI or is it fair to argue he was so moved by the agency's failure he voluntarily revealed he was concerned and was going to take a personal interest in this matter? That's the question to be asked when he appeared in the manner he did as documented in *Another Coalition Warning of Consequences if Chinada Security Forces Interfere*. Coalition partners at CBS news wanted to make sure reform of federal law enforcement was a top priority so they played the clip referred to in that documentation on March 4<sup>th</sup>.

On May 8<sup>th</sup> the FBI Director was before the House Judiciary Committee and made it undeniable he is concerned about the Chinada threat; his concerns cannot but be motivated by abdications of national security responsibility by both the Bush and Obama administrations.

We're also seeing a growing [14:06: Z-J M.] insider threat - that is, when employees use their legitimate access to steal secrets for the benefit of another country.



Turning to cyber, of course [Z-J M.] the counter-intelligence threat is now emerging with the cyber threat.

We in the Bureau have [14:57: R-S M.] built up a substantial expertise to address these threats both at home and abroad.



[...]

We have [15:13: Kernan M.] sixty-three attaché offices that cover the globe and assist in addressing the cyber threat.



Observed again is just how geo-wired these committee rooms are. When the director and camera crew are about to change filming angles a staffer is choreographed to execute a scratching gesture [@ 15:37] which reminds

everyone of the use of stealth cognition technologies to torture the Canadian lawyer and other victims.



Next appears to be his insistence that the settlement be finalized so capital can be used to generate economic activity and create jobs.

Turning to health care fraud [16:26: R-S M.] health care spending currently makes up 18% of our nation's total economy.

I do believe any discussion of that warrants looking at that particular crimes at -- for which incarceration is very difficult to generalize; or to reach [25:56: Z-J M.] some sort understanding and make progress with that generalization.



He returns to the FBI's role in advancing coalition interests and objectives.

We then [27:13 R-S M.] understanding that we needed a closer view of this we pulled together 30 personnel, agents and others to go through the  $\dots$ 



In this next excerpt we see him showing sensitivity to the failings of the FBI in investigating what the Canadian submitted in late February 2011.

We are talking now with the Department of Justice in terms of how we go back - the universe of cases we wish to review to determine whether or not examiners [29:14: Pfeiffer M.] in cases probably prior to 1996 may have overstated the import, the impact, of their hair analysis.



Just how widespread is knowledge of what Congress did to placate a livid coalition is observed in the fact that the FBI Director also puts on the record his understanding of that circumstance. He employs not one, but two geogestures to make it unequivocally clear he is privy to that development and why.

There are two areas which I guess I should focus. The first is on the 2013 budget [31:25: q-Eva M.] that has gone through Congress -- at least the initial stages of Congress [31:31: Z-J M.] at this point.



He indicates there's a need to shore up legislation to prevent further abuses of power and share intel on the Chinada threat to protect U.S. interests.

The first area [of concern] and not necessarily addressed in the bills is mandatory reporting of substantial cyber incidents; which we believe should be part of the statute at some point in time. [40:12: Bernanke M.] And the second is the sharing of intelligence.



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Paul Volker did on May  $9^{th}$  what he sought on March  $15^{th}$  - saturating his testimony with the lexicon to generate messages relating to coalition interests and objectives.

[Banking's] moved towards a much more transaction oriented center - concentration. That's particularly true with [4:50: Sarkozy M.] the bigger banks; and its certainly in the process would become much more complex and a lot more opaque; very complicated...



[...] We need some structural changes. [5:42: Branson M.] It's evolved around the issue of too big to fail.



After the crisis, maybe it's a smaller volume. [7:51: Pfeiffer M.] But everything is relative. I'm told there are \$700 trillion in derivatives outstanding in the world today. \$700 trillion ...



## [...]

I would only say in that connection, sometimes talk is about purely a risk factor. It's a risk factor; there's no question. This is speculative trading. But its influence goes far beyond the particular [9:03: Colbert M.] risks involved in particular transactions.



... and that will be a [14:29: Branson M.] continuing supervisory challenge to make sure the banks are properly creating these...



## [...]

But before [bank consolidation] -- [15:49: Pfeiffer M.] -- it seems like yesterday I was in the Federal Reserve. It wasn't yesterday; it was a good many yesterdays ago. But at that time banks could not branch outside the home states, by and large. And the United States had one of the most decentralized banking systems. It's suddenly [16:05: Z-J M.] gone from a decentralized system into a rather concentrated system; which I think is unfortunate [cringe].









Senator Bob Corker (R - Tennessee) indicates the rules governing what should have been prevented are under review.

[20:14: Branson M.] Some of the -- we've looked at [Bl.M.] some of the rules; and by the way we've always understood that what you intended ...





Mr. Volker continues to do what he's now famous for doing. While there's been undue and inexplicable delay, he's of the view that all will occur.

... beyond a certain point liquid markets - highly liquid markets - are not in the public interest. I could give you other analyses. But it's [25:28: Cl.M.] a matter of time.



He also sees the need for legislative and regulatory reform.

We have to carry more capital than Japanese banks. I would rather have smaller banks and stronger banks. You see what happened in Japan with their big banks. It wasn't at all a great treat. So my answer is very simple: [26:37: Cl.M.] we got -- we want to make some rules that are consistent with banks doing their basic job...



[...]

Because when you're in crisis everybody leaps over those boundaries. And authorities say 'okay we gotta crisis, go ahead and leap'.

I'd like to think of [28:49: pro Branson M.] these ring fences like a favorite British term: you got a ring fence to ... My experience with ring fences is the gophers go underneath and the deer jump over.



Senator Mike Johanns (R - Nebraska) appears to contribute to the rule reform issue:

...passage of Dodd Frank; it was [30:40: Pfeiffer M.] at a point in time where the Volker Rule was unveiled.



He also expresses the view that matters have dragged on unreasonably and ought to be resolved expeditiously.

I was getting to the fact there are  $\underline{\textbf{1,3}}00^*$  questions and [32:01: Branson M.] it just kinda goes on and on and on.

Mr. Volker draws a contrast between what the coalition has that Chinada doesn't:

[37:42: Eva M.] Let me make one point: those countries; their banks are not bigger than our banks. But the countries are smaller.



## Next comes

(i) the sense of defencelessness to the Chinada threat because of its economic methodology of imperialism, (ii) the value in what Congress allocated (iii) what those funds will do to terminate the risk that Chinada creates and (iv) acknowledging the arrogant belligerence associated with the settlement.

[38:00: Sarkozy M.] So they feel more vulnerable than we feel I think to these problems [Sarkozy M.]. Switzerland was, obviously very concerned because they have two big banks. Both were in trouble. One was in severe trouble. They took strong measures including exceptionally high capital standards and other measures [38:15: Cl.M.]; and my understanding is -- and [Cl.M.] find out more directly -- my understanding is that the biggest of those banks has practically given up proprietary trading. Whatever the law said I'm sure they were under pressure from the central bank. And they have moved away from some of these activities to non-risky activities - to investment -- basically toward investment banking. Traditional banking [38:42: Cl.M.] one side; and investment management on the other side. [Cl.M.] And they have been [Cl.M.] de-risked [chuckle] substantially. There's been some reaction [CBS-Cl.M.] along the same lines at some of the British banks.







Lastly, Mr. Volker reminds everyone of the multitude of confirmations and corroborations about the Canadian's invitation to the White House beginning in late July 2009 which went to proving the lack of bona fides in presidential diplomacy and piggybacking unlawfulness. The latest offer which also didn't materialize is documented in <u>President Obama Resuscitates Canadian Lawyer Invitation to the White House</u>.

Not insignificant, [39:08: pro Branson M.] I was invited to go to have a little session with the European Parliament with the British regulators and the Commission. ... He said I'll have a better feel for how coordinated we are next month; but I think the obvious purpose of the invitation was to try to get a maximum amount of coordination.





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On May 14<sup>th</sup> one of the most revered coalition partners in Congress was in the 'electronic room' and sought to move his state's entitlement from...


The Senator, who was more than affected by the Cold War in its Vietnam incarnation, laments the fact that China's leaders prefer arrogance, conflict and confrontation rather than being welcome and appreciated members of the international community.

I guess what I'm trying to say in summary is when I was present as [44:30: Kernan M.] a not so young Naval officer with a group of senators at the occasion of the normalization of relations with China in the Great Hall and Deng Xio Ping was going around and everybody was having to drink that kerosene [audience laughter]; and I'm sure he was drinking water. Ah [Federer-Cl.M.] that we had high hopes for China. We didn't -- we thought that there would be a significant amount of progress. And in a number of areas I don't think we have seen those expecta -- in a number of areas I don't think those expectations have been fulfilled.




Because of the belligerence and multi-year intention of maintaining joint governance of Canada in violation of international law, the PRC is going to be challenged until they relent.

Again, I do not envision any confrontation between the United States and China. It is not in China's interests, it's not in the United State's interests. I do not envision that. But I do think that there's going to be some internal problems that the Chinese are going to have to grapple with [45:29: Federer-Cl.M.].



I do support a free trade agreement between the United States and Taiwan. I support free trade agreements, actually you know the [46:29: Kernan M.] proposed Pacific overall trade agreements. Um, the [Pacino M.] the first question -- I think that the trade -- we obviously have a serious trade deficit with China and I do believe that we could make significant improvements there.



The Senator equates the same threat posed by MK-Ultra as by nuclear weapons.

The Iranians [56:21: Kernan M.] they are not only developing nuclear weapons, we all know that. There's a great debate as to how far along they are and what their real intentions are. But they have enriched uranium and have taken [Branson M.] other steps to further the development of nuclear weapons. But the Iranians are also behaving badly throughout the world, including here in the United States of America. They had a plot to assassinate the Saudi Ambassador here in Washington; Cafe Milano.



Producers goes on to indirectly corroborate Congress' allocation and directly refer to the fact that Canada is such a wealth country that in due course and under the Canadian's federal governance leadership can repay it all back.

It's too expensive for my tastes, but I can see why the Saudi Arabian [57:03: attendee: dbl-h Shafer M.] can afford to pick up the tab.



Having felt he made a major contribution to coalition interests and objectives, he concludes with what is the case for the Chinada High Command.

[59:10] Remember the words of Chairman Mao, who once said "It's always darkest before it's totally black" [audience laughter; he smiles]. Thank-you very much.



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On May 16<sup>th</sup> the FBI Director again offers geo-remarks on a wide range of topics. He begins by conveying his gratitude to the Canadian for his assistance in protecting a multitude of American interests.

Good morning and thank-you Chairman Leahy and ranking member Grassley and other members of the Committee. I want to thank you for the opportunity to appear before the Committee today [18:02: Brooke M.] and most particularly to thank you for your continued support...



Chairman Leahy puts the FBI Director on notice that his committee will ensure investigations of MK-Ultra Gate related behavior are being conducted competently and there will be results. The witness acknowledges that.

Leahy: What actions have been taken [26:08: Branson M.]? Do

you have a way [Branson M.] to ensure all evidence is retested? Are there ways of making sure that notifications are made so that nobody remains in jail based on faulty

evidence?

Meuller: [26:25: Eva M.] Mr. Chairman, there was a review done



A geo-gesture is employed by Director Mueller that suggests the surveillance and intel collection of Canada is so ubiquitous that any attempt to threaten the life of the Canadian will be detected in advance and steps taken to prevent that unlawfulness. Several times have partners indicated that all reasonable measures will be implemented to ensure his safety: *The Coalition's Taking No Chances with the Canadian Lawyer's Safety During and After His Geographical Emancipation* and *Another Coalition Warning of Consequences if Chinada Security Forces Interfere*:

Secondly, we have what we call a [32:14: Cl.M.] a violent offender alert system...



The Chairman questions the witness again on coalition matters; this time asking about whether legislative measures are being taken to prevent the kinds of abuses of power engaged in by the White House, Pentagon and CIA through two successive administrations.

There have been press reports the FBI has been seeking expand [X] to require Internet Service Providers and other online services to make their products amenable to government surveillance. And there have been recent published reports about draft legislative proposals circulating, although the administration [33:34: R-S M.] is not sending them up here. Can I be expecting a specific legislative proposal from the FBI or administration in the near future?



Senator Grassley insists that whatever evidence the FBI discovers will be forwarded to the committee.

Did the Justice Department share records with the FBI about what notifications went to the prosecutor? [...] Well, okay, there's one area that we should all be able to agree on is this one; that defense counsel ought to be notified or the person who's in jail ought to be notified [35:43: R-S M. to Z-J M.] if there's other information that might bear on the case.



In furtherance of President Obama's 'come to Washington and pick up your allocated funds', Senator Grassley more than hints at using a government aircraft to get the Canadian in Dogville and transport him to the nation's capital.

And it's my understanding according to my friend on my left here that this may have been a policy going back prior to this administration. If so I still would like information [38:01: pro Letterman M.].

Ah, then [38:05: Aussie M., Stewart M.] you won't be able to answer this, but I'm interested in the cost and so include that in your answer to me. And according to information provided me the FBI may have had to lease a private plane because the FBI jet was reserved for senior Justice Department officials.



On the issue of where the MK-Ultra Gate investigation is and the underlying threat that is the Chinada High Command, the FBI Director puts it at the top of the priority list.

When we [cut due to budget constraints] we have to prioritize. And the priorities we have, ah, counter-terrorism, ah, counter-intelligence; espionage is number two; and cyber -- the three top national security. And you cannot particularly in the cyber realm cut there. So you have to look for coverage, or cuts in the criminal programs. And where we would end up doing it I don't know. But one has to prioritize [46:25: Cl.M.].




When the witness is pressed on the existence of investigations and prosecutions *viz.* MK-Ultra Gate, the committee gets another assurance that they are on track.

Senator Kohl:

This big jump in the number of investigations suggests that the problem may be even greater than we had previously thought. Given the increase of investigations, the ever growing threat to American businesses, jobs and our economy do you have the needed resources to continue to keep -- to step up enforcement of economic espionage and trade secret theft? Can we expect to see an increase in these investigations and prosecutions?


Mueller:

[50:30: Geo W M.] Increasing investigations and prosecutions follows increase in personnel.



Senator Hatch not only follows up on that line of questioning, he identifies with specificity when the FBI was first contacted to launch an investigation, being just under a year and a half ago when the agency's Directorate of Intelligence was in possession of the Canadian's first criminal complaint on February 24, 2011.

Your agency is [54:53: Z-J M.] conducting the investigation into the death of border patrol agent [X] on December 14th, 2010. [Staul M.] It's been a year and a half since this investigation began. [...] Can I ask you what is the status of that investigation?



Director Mueller's behavioral response to hearing the exact period of time that's transpired since that filing is to drop his eyes; which to psychologists is a tacit admission that the agency dropped the ball and only when Congress began putting the pressure on did his office take the matter seriously.


Mueller: [55:45: eyes down] I can tell you it's an on-going very active investigation. [Staffer: Geo W M.]

This constitutes the kind of checks and balances dysfunctionality that when added to MK-Ultra malfeasance and impropriety proves the deteriorated state of American democracy.

It'll be recalled that the first time the FBI Director stepped in to the back-channel was in early February 2012 compliments of CBS news as documented:

FBI Director Robert Mueller offered his opinion on what the Chinada menace represents to U.S. interests:

I do believe that the cyber-threat [3:54: Pacino M.] will equal or surpass the threat from counter-terrorism in the foreseeable future.
